


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### **About**

decolonize! is CRIF's flagship grantmaking portfolio. The objective of this portfolio is to radically re-imagine how the children's rights movement can be resourced, by explicitly addressing legacies of colonialism, anti-Blackness, and adultism as experienced by youth activists.

The first round of the decolonize! grants traced the trans-atlantic slave trade, with the aim of supporting the work of youth activists responding to the effects of colonialism and racism in their communities, of West Africa, the Caribbean, Central and South America and the USA.



# History and context of decolonize!

In 2020, the confluence of urgency—both of a global health pandemic and long- standing racialized state violence, put a spotlight on the heightened vulnerability of young people as they marched through the streets, masked, powerfully defending their rights and standing together in solidarity all over the world. But the children's rights sector was silent. And so, CRIF created decolonize! to support Black children and youth to launch new or strengthen existing initiatives to combat racism and colonialism and to learn from and share these initiatives with those in the children's rights sector.

## decolonize! collaborative

Eight Black child and youth activists served on the inaugural Collaborative for decolonize! This group collaborated across 5 languages over nine months to design the grantmaking strategy, select grantee partners, support movement building and keep CRIF accountable to our joint vision of challenging the legacies of colonialism, anti-Blackness, and adultism in philanthropy.

Prior to the shortlisting process, all eligible applications were translated across the different working languages and made available to all collaborative members.

# **Shortlisting**

During the process of shortlisting, collaborative members met within their regional groups to discuss which applications from their respective regions they wanted to support and bring to the bigger group.

### Selection

Selection was carried out over 3 days, where regional groups advocated for their regions passionately, and upholding a rigorous criteria of integrity and community contribution. These sessions saw passionate debate and group consensus based on a commitment to common goals.





# 5 things we learnt about decolonising children's rights

- Consistent communication matters more than perfect results when collaborating with young people.
- 2. Young people raising concerns in collaborations matters there are deeply held values usually informing these actions.
- **3.** A tree can weather a storm if it has deep roots trust and respect are the magic ingredients in funders' relationships with youth activists.
- Language justice will slow you down and cost you money but it is key to trans-cultural and transnational collaborations.
- 5. They will not always do what 'we' want them to Acknowledge adultism as an operating logic and find ways to manage frustration that emerges in youth led work, without letting it spill over into their processes.
